When the Oilers take the field Saturday in the North Coast Section 3A playoffs, they do so as the No. 1 seed for the third straight season.

Their reputation on the field allow Siles to schedule matches with De La Salle and teams from the East Bay Athletic League, schools known for their deep pockets and links to talent from well-funded club teams.

The Oilers, who have won 11 Alameda Contra Costa Athletic League titles and one NCS championship, have established themselves as one of Northern California's best teams. Richmond has won the ACCAL title the past three seasons.

So the question arises: How do the Oilers do it?

"I think it's because as a group we all love soccer, that's what keeps us together," senior midfielder Carlos Venegas said. "Soccer is within us. It doesn't matter if we don't have a good field or struggle financially, but soccer is what we like to do, it's what we do and that's how we beat teams like De La Salle. ... rich schools, private schools."

## Financial need

Siles and his players arrived on the first day of practice to find that two stolen cars had been driven through a gate and onto the Richmond High field. Donuts and tire tracks were left everywhere on the already uneven, muddy surface.

The players didn't let it dampen their spirits. Perhaps the biggest trip in the history of the program — to the heralded West Coast Classic in Irvine - was on the horizon.

The only question was how the Oilers would afford it. The coaches paid a \$400 registration fee for the tournament without knowing how they would afford the transportation and housing

"We don't do it for the money, right?" Siles said.

Then the community responded.

Donations from private businesses and community organizations began to pour in. The Seville Group (a construction tend college. "I want to get a de-

company) and the North East Neighborhood Council in Richmond led the way. The money was raised, and the trip was on.

Janet Ceja-Orosco, whose son Victor graduated last year, is the team's manager, but she does much more than just purchase uniforms and equipment and rent buses for travel. She often opens her own pocketbook.

"Basically I rent (the buses) on my credit card and then we try to pay it back, which is not a smart thing to do, but it's the only way we can do it," Ceja-Orosco said.

# New place, dreams

Ramiro Martinez, a senior who leads the Oilers in scoring, had doubts when he first joined the team.

When I got here, I wanted to go back. I felt uncomfortable, said Martinez, who arrived from Michoacan, Mexico, when he was 15. "Now it's nice. That's what helped me. I didn't have any friends, and I met a lot of people and it helped me.'

The Oilers represent much more than a soccer team to Martinez. Three years ago, the soccer program was his bridge to the United States.

"I didn't want to enter school because I didn't have any friends,' Martinez said in Spanish. "My sister (Liensy) knew I liked to play soccer, so she brought me to the team. I started playing. When I found soccer, I haven't thought about going home."

It's a familiar story. Nearly half of Richmond's players come from Mexico, Central America and South America.

"Soccer is something that they know," Siles said. "It gives them a sense of direction. It's a way to make friends. It's a way to feel safe. What we're trying to do at Richmond High is to use that to direct them toward education."

Venegas, who arrived as an 11-year-old from Mexicali, now speaks fluent English. He helped Martinez write an essay so he could make his grades and stay on the field.

"We all support each other," said Venegas, who hopes to atgree. That's my goal."

Martinez wants to play in college as well. Few players from Richmond have done so over the years. Siles, with the help of Danville resident Brad Blake, hopes to make it happen more often.

# College is real

"It all started last spring," said Blake, an assistant coach for Monte Vista High's junior varsity girls soccer team. "I thought it was a pretty inspiring story.

Monte Vista defeated Richmond 2-1 in an NCS playoff game in 2005. But even in their dejection, the Oilers showed the sportsmanship for which they have become known.

As the Mustangs left the field to board their bus, Richmond fans and players gave Monte Vista a standing ovation. Then-Mustangs coach Fred Wilson said it was one of the most inspiring things he had ever seen.

Word got around, and Blake knew he had to do something to help.

He started "College is Real" for Richmond's boys and girls soccer teams. The program encourages youngsters to aim high.

Blake's donation funded a teacher on campus to monitor grades and paid for trips to Cal, Stanford, USF and UC Davis.

"I decided this fall to use my resources and relationships to help the kids on the academic side of things," said Blake, CEO of a real estate development and investment company. "It was nice to see if we could create a boost on the academic side and create opportunities for them."

# Pride in Richmond

Flores, 28, a member of Richmond's lone NCS championship team in 1994, knows what the Oilers represent.

"First, in order to defend something, you have to be proud of it," Flores said. "We represent not just the team, but the school, the city. I told them what's happening, that we're in the No. 1 crime city. But we can change that. We can put Richmond in the news for something positive."

Flores asked his players in January to list 10 reasons why they wanted to win the NCS championship.

"For my family," one said.

"For the people who don't believe in us. (And) for the people who do believe in us," another

"It's pride" Flores said. Then he pointed to an answer that made him smile.

"For the community," it read. "For Richmond."
